

EQUITABLE STROKE CONTROL™ (ESC™) FOR AN 18-HOLE HANDICAP INDEX

How to Adjust Your Score

- Equitable Stroke Control (ESC) sets a maximum number of strokes that a player can post on any hole and is incumbent upon that player's Course Handicap™.
- For handicap purposes, a player is required to adjust hole scores (actual or most likely) when they are higher than the player's maximum ESC number.
- There is no limit to the number of holes on which a player can adjust hole scores and a player must adjust all scores for handicap purposes, including tournament scores.

Example: Player A has a Handicap Index 10.4 and plays from the middle tees with a Slope Rating® of 125, which converts to a Course Handicap of 12. Player A's maximum ESC number is 7 for the middle tees. However, if Player A moves to the forward tees with a Slope Rating of 102, A's Course Handicap is 9. Player A's maximum ESC number is double bogey for the forward tees.

To Apply ESC

- Scan the scorecard for any hole where a score (actual or most likely) is higher than the maximum ESC number.
- Reduce higher scores to the maximum ESC number for handicap posting purposes.
- Post the adjusted gross score.
